New Mexico's Measles Response

The New Mexico Department of Health officially declared a Measles outbreak on February 14. New Mexico met the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's outbreak criteria with three (unrelated) cases in Lea County.

As soon as the outbreak was declared, the plan was to do a small, scaled incident command structure that swiftly responded to the immediate need of preventing disease spread. The Hobbs Public Health Office organized vaccination clinics that began the first weekend and continued the following week. Southeast Region staff collaborated with the mobile vaccine team in providing access to MMR vaccinations to the community.

Remembering back to December 27, 2020, the first ever International Day of Epidemic Preparedness was held, called for

vaccinated The Program received much praise and thanks regarding the work we continue to do surrounding vaccines for all New Mexicans.



by the United Nations General Assembly to advocate the importance of the prevention of, preparedness for and partnership against epidemics. Today, this serves as an important reminder about the public health efforts that have been established to respond to the COVID-19 Pandemic and to be prepared for potential future outbreaks. New Mexico is using the tools in our toolbox!

Incorporating subject matter experts is key for preparedness readiness. We learned from the COVID-19 Pandemic that partnerships are indispensible when responding. No one organization can do the uplift alone—it takes the community as a whole.

Messaging is a priority as New Mexico and surrounding states are experiencing measles cases. Providing up-to-date information in our messaging is critical.

The importance of vaccination catch-up and guidance is another priority. The NMDOH has created a dedicated Measles page with outbreak guidance that features frequently asked questions, resources, and case counts that shows the latest data in New Mexico. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention is updating their webpage with counts from all states that have measles cases. Thank you, New Mexico, for responding and vaccinating to protect our communities.

The approach to the measles outbreak consists of three steps:



Prevent disease with vaccine



Where are there cases?



Respond with immediate action to control and prevent disease spread.

Webinar on Pneumococcal Disease

On March 19, the New Mexico Immunization Coalition, New Mexico Department of Health, and Comagine Health held a webinar outlining the epidemiology of invasive pneumococcal disease (IPD) in New Mexico and the different vaccines that are now available to protect against IPD. The speakers were Jessica Houston, an epidemiologist from NMDOH's Active Bacterial Core Surveillance team, and Melissa Martinez, MD, a practicing Family Medicine Doctor at UNM and immunization expert. Over 80 people tuned in to the webinar live. If you missed the webinar, you can watch the recording online here.

Rates of pneumococcal disease have declined dramatically since 2000, when the PCV7 vaccine was introduced for children. Each time a new vaccine targeting more strains of streptococcus pneumoniae is introduced, we have seen a drop in case rates. During the COVID pandemic we saw another drop due to social distancing, maskwearing and fewer interactions

with large groups. Sadly, case rates have now returned to pre-pandemic levels.

A new version of the PCV21 vaccine was recently licensed and recommended.



This new version covers many of the same strains as PCV20 and PCV15, but adds some new ones and, notably, does not include some strains such as serotype 4.

New Mexico and other western states have seen an uptick in cases caused by serotype 4, $\sim 30\%$ of the cases. This leads to the question: which vaccine is appropriate to give to which patients?

Alcoholism, chronic lung disease, cigarette smoking, homelessness and injection drug use all are considered risk factors for IPD, and the vaccine containing the serotype 4 might be a better choice for people with those risk factors. For older adults, the new PCV21 vaccine might provide better coverage for the strains that predominate in adults over 50. The webinar provided nuanced guidance as how to best serve patients by considering their age and risk factors.




