

Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services' (CMS) New Provider Types for 2024: Marriage and Family Therapists (MFT) and Mental Health Counselors (MHC)

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CMS began providing coverage for marriage & family therapy and mental health services effective 01/01/2024. This comes at a perfect time, as more Americans are seeking help to treat marriage & family issues and mental health continues to be a rising concern nationwide. CMS's Strategic Plan has 6 strategic pillars of focus which drive the agency's efforts to cut costs, improve efficiency, and enhance access to care, including increased access to behavioral health services.¹ Expanding access to care requires creativity and flexibility in light of the nationwide, chronic provider shortage.² Let's discuss one creative strategy to leverage existing behavioral healthcare resources that was recently passed into law.

H.R.2617 – Consolidated Appropriations Act 2023 Section 4121 provides for coverage of marriage and family therapist services and mental health counselor services under Part B of the Medicare program.³ This is good news for Marriage and Family Therapists (MFTs), Mental Health Counselors (MHCs), behavioral healthcare facilities, and patients, as the more than 62,000 MFTs⁴ and more than 344,000 MHCs⁵ in the U.S will now be accessible for services for Medicare patients effective January 1, 2024. Enrollment as a Medicare provider is required.

To be enrolled for Medicare, MFTs and MHCs must meet the CMS specifications outlined in Section 4121, which indicates that the individual "has performed at least 2 years of clinical supervised experience in marriage and family therapy or mental health counseling" in addition to possessing the required degree and licensing requirements.
