# The Center for Development and Disability

The Center for Development and Disability (CDD) is New Mexico's University Center for Excellence in Developmental Disability Education, Research and Service (previously known as UAP). These centers are authorized by the Developmental Disabilities Assistance and Bill of Rights Act to build the capacities of states and communities to respond to the needs of individuals with developmental disabilities and their families, and are given core funding by the Administration on Developmental Disabilities (ADD). Funding for other programs and projects is obtained through state contracts, federal grants, and private funding. There are 61 centers located in every state and territory, which function as a national network of programs.

The mission of the CDD is the full inclusion of people with disabilities and their families in their community by: engaging individuals in making life choices; partnering with communities to build resources; and improving systems of care.

The CDD accomplishes this mission through innovative:

- Interdisciplinary training
- Dissemination of information
- Provision of exemplary direct service and technical assistance
- Applied research

The following values direct the work of the CDD and its programs:



# OUR VISION

Guided by individuals with disabilities and their families who help design, provide, and evaluate our efforts, the Center for Development and Disability:

- Identifies, develops and strengthens opportunities and choices for all persons with disabilities and their families throughout their lives so that they are included in all aspects of society;
- Participates in collaborations to enhance resources and maximize opportunities for all persons with disabilities, their families and those who support them;
- Responds to the most important interests and concerns of all persons with disabilities and their families through leadership in education, research and service; and
- Influences policies to reflect what is known about the variety of strengths and needs of all persons with disabilities and their families, while recognizing and integrating the diverse values of individuals, families and communities.

# **CDD Programs and Projects**

The Center for Development and Disability consists of numerous programs funded by a variety of different state and federal agencies. All CDD programs are committed to the mission of the CDD and to providing services and supports to individuals with disabilities and their families throughout New Mexico. CDD programs support the mission of the University of New Mexico Health Sciences Center as follows:

# Innovative, Collaborative Interdisciplinary Education

Access to Electronic Health trains library & information providers in senior centers on accessing health information on disabilities & related issues & facilitates partnerships among existing consumer health information networks in New Mexico.

The Autism Summer Institute, a four day intensive training in applied behavioral analysis for teachers, therapists & family members.

The CDD Partnership Initiative developed a series of recommendations for recruitment & training of advisory board members & a system of co-worker supports.

Disability Determination Services/LEND Collaborative is a technical assistance grant to create programmatic relationships in order to improve the speed and accuracy of determining eligibility for children's Supplemental Security Income (SSI).

The Early Childhood Evaluation Program offers training & technical assistance to community providers, local healthcare providers, students from multiple disciplines, & others serving young children with suspected disabilities or special health care needs.

Early Childhood Network provides collaborative & responsive training, consultation & technical assistance to groups & individuals working with infants & toddlers with developmental delays or risk conditions, & with their families statewide.

Early Success Through Inclusion: A Video Project, funded by the New Mexico State Department of Education, will feature successful inclusion education programs for young children with disabilities throughout the state.

The Family and Community Education in ASD is a statewide family support, technical assistance & training network that employs trained regional parent coordinators to provide training & support in their communities.

Family Support Project is a systems change project that is working with families of adolescents and young adults with developmental disabilities & the NM Department of Health to develop a model of family directed support.

Improving Communities of Practice is developing a comprehensive system of personnel development for eighty-three Bureau of Indian Affairs schools across the Navajo nation in Arizona, Utah, & New Mexico.

The Medically Fragile Case Management Program trains undergraduate & graduate nurses in RN case management.

National Native American Early Childhood Meeting was a national effort of the Bureau of Indian Affairs to provide guidance & support to individual tribal programs serving young children (0-5) with disabilities & their families.

NM LEND Program is a graduate & post-graduate leadership training program in neurodevelopmental disabilities covering specific areas such as clinical skills, public policy, leadership skills, genetics, ethics, & family centered care.

NO Walls is a community technology center, which collaborates with the Albuquerque Public Library to increase the capacity of persons with disabilities, their families, service providers, teachers, & advocates in the Albuquerque metropolitan area to use computer technology to access information.

Parents with Disabilities training was developed & provided in collaboration with New Mexico State University to Children Youth & Families workers.

The **Preschool Network** provides training, technical assistance, & evaluation support to those working with young children 3-5 years old with developmental delays, or special education needs in New Mexico.

**Project Na'nitin** developed training to maximize the knowledge & skills of Navajo paraprofessionals & parents to work more effectively with children with special needs.



# **Interdisciplinary Education (continued)**

**Project SET** offers training & technical assistance to community teams, including parents, who work with young children with Autism Spectrum Disorder.

An annual **Public Policy Institute** provides training for graduate students, family members, & pediatric residents on the legislative process & how to positively impact public policy.

The **Santa Fe Transition Alliance** provided training & technical assistance on individual & family-centered transition planning.

The **SSI Training Project** is a collaborative project with AUCD & SSA to provide training for case adjudicators determining SSI disability eligibility.

Summer Institute for Special Education, a national training institute for school teams from Bureau of Indian Affairs schools nationwide, was held in the summer of 2002 in partnership with the Bureau of Indian Affairs.

# **Distance Learning and Web-based Courses**

Assessment and Interventions: Case Studies in Deafblindness, an online web course, was developed to encourage participants to discuss assessment & intervention strategies through problem based learning & case analysis on a variety of children & youth who are deafblind.

Autism Spectrum Disorder is an online web-course & was developed to train interdisciplinary teams with the overall goal of increasing the participants' skills in the development of individualized educational programs for children with pervasive developmental disorder/autism.

**Early and Emergent Literacy** is an online web course developed by the Preschool Network & available for three college credit hours through New Mexico State University or a Certificate of Completion.

Functional Behavior and Positive Supports, an online web course on functional behavioral analysis (assessment) & positive behavior supports for children in public schools.

Overview of Deafblindness with an Emphasis in Communication is an online web course sponsored by the CDD & the New Mexico State University & is designed for families, individuals, or educational teams working with an individual who is deafblind.

**Project SET** (Specialized Early Teaching for Young Children with Autism Spectrum Disorders) is offering a series of region-based, online discussions designed for individuals interested in young children, up to 5 years of age, with confirmation of Autism Spectrum Disorder diagnosis.

**Self Study Course in Autism** is a web-based course designed for personnel serving adults with autism.



# **Applied Research and Policy Analysis**

Accessible Transportation was a collaborative effort with NM P & A and DDPC, that conducted qualitative research on the bus system in Albuquerque & its ability to provide transportation services for individuals with a variety of disabilities.

Annual Research Symposium on Disability and Health in New Mexico is held in collaboration with the NM Department of Health.

Barriers to Employment documented the barriers to employment for people with severe disabilities & created a guide with information and strategies.

A Comparison of the Scores of Two Motor Tests, the Motor Scale of the Bayley Scales of Infant Development II & the Peabody Developmental Motor Scales, is being conducted.

Diversability conducted public hearings to gather input from people with disabilities about the services received through the One Stop Career Centers, & provided training to One Stop Career Centers serving customers with disabilities.

**Emergency Preparedness** is funded by the Department of Health to assist in emergency preparedness planning for individuals with disabilities.

Emotion-Related Learning and Affective Identification in Children with Autism is an interdisciplinary pilot project investigating the abilities of children with autism to change their behavior by using information in the environment.

Health Care Systems and Persons with ASD in New Mexico is developing a action plan with the Medicaid Managed Care Organizations in New Mexico to serve the needs of children with Autism Spectrum Disorder.

Health Promotion and Disease Prevention for People with Disabilities in collaboration with the Office of Disability and Health, will implement and compare two health promotion interventions for people with disabilities; collect, analyze, & disseminate disability data; & provide capacity building efforts within the Department of Health to promote the health of people with disabilities.

Health Promotion for People who are Paralyzed is a grant from the Christopher and Dana Reeve Foundation to test & evaluate the health intervention, The Take Charge Challenge, with people who are paralyzed.

Long Term Services Division Database oversees the collection & analysis of data around staff training & turnover of personnel in community agencies.

Quarterly meetings of the MCHB Collaborative, consisting of representatives from MCHB funded programs in New Mexico, are held to discuss future directions.

Preschool Practices and Professional Development Priorities in New Mexico's Preschool Programs is a survey of teachers, paraprofessionals, evaluators, therapists, & administrators in New Mexico public preschool programs, assessing professional development & preschool practices.

**Project Mealtime** is investigating the feeding behavior of young children with Autism Spectrum Disorder.

Technical Assistance Document for Early Childhood Assessment Report Writing is being developed collaboratively with the New Mexico State University & from the New Mexico Guidelines for Early Childhood Assessment Reports recently completed.

## Interdisciplinary Healthcare

**Autism Diagnostic Clinic** sees children ages 3 through 21 to confirm or rule out the diagnosis of autism.

Early Childhood Evaluation Program provides statewide diagnostic development evaluation services for children birth to three years of age in their communities. On-going training and technical assistance to providers & supports to families are offered through on-site or distance communication, including UNM's Telehealth facilities.

Indian Children's Program provides supplemental services to Native American children birth through 21 years old who have developmental disabilities and special needs.

Medically Fragile Case Management Program provides nurse case management services to medically fragile individuals & their families throughout New Mexico through nine community based satellites.

**Project SET** provides consultative services for young children with Autism Spectrum Disorder to assist early intervention pro-

grams & schools in developing effective intervention plans.

Supports and Assessment for Feeding and Eating (SAFE) Clinic is a lifespan feeding & aspiration prevention clinic for individuals with developmental disabilities.

#### **Dissemination of Information**

Bilingual Services for the CDD Information Services was supported by the State Department of Education. With this additional funding, information & referral for Spanish-language calls can be made. Funding also supported the purchase of Spanish-language materials.

CDD Library and Information Network for the Community (LINC) has a web-based catalogue of comprehensive resources, consisting of books, video cassettes, audio cassettes, training manuals, & periodicals, that address the information needs of individuals with disabilities, their families, providers, & advocates.



**Early Childhood UPDATES** is a monthly newsletter produced & disseminated by the Early Childhood Division with a focus on services for children 0-3 years old & their families. It is also available online.

Information Center for NM with Disabilities and Babynet is an information & referral center.

**Internet Access to Digital Libraries** is connectivity grant, providing computers for satellite CDD personnel, & training to health professionals on accessing health information through the NLM databases.

**NETWORK NEWS** is a bi-monthly newsletter produced & disseminated by the Preschool Network, for those serving children with special needs in New Mexico preschool settings. It is also available online.

Satellite Resource Collections for Early Childhood are being established at three sites across the state through the Preschool Network for wider access to early childhood professional journals, videos, books, & other resources.

**Touch Points** is a newsletter for families & providers for children who have dual sensory impairments & is produced & disseminated by the Project for New Mexico Children & Youth who are Deaf/Blind.



#### **CDD DATA FOR FY03**

- The CDD provided **365 trainings** to more than **12,643 participants** covering a wide variety of topics in the filed of developmental disabilities.
- Technical assistance was provided by the different CDD programs to numerous agencies throughout the state; greater than 616 technical assistance requests were responded to and more than 7,000 individuals participated.
- Through the various clinical programs in the CDD, 983 clients received clinical service, many several times throughout the year (20,290 visits).
- The CDD Library and Information Network for the Community (LINC) responded to 1,026 requests for information from family members, self advocates, providers and state agencies.
- The Information Center for New Mexicans with Disabilities and Babynet, provided information and referral services to **1,928** callers from throughout New Mexico.
- Clinical, training and/or technical assistance activities were conducted by CDD programs in every county in New Mexico.
- Approximately **300** healthcare professional students from several different disciplines (medicine, nursing, physical therapy, occupational therapy, speech therapy, audiology, social work, nutrition, psychology, and health administration) received training on developmental disabilities from CDD faculty and staff.
