Breaking Silence, Breaking Walls: Angel Island Poetry as Prison Writing

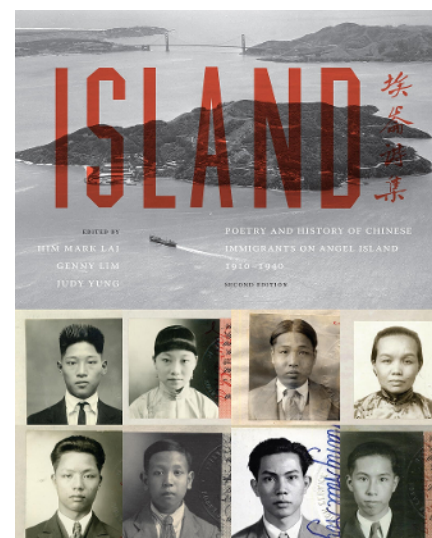

Join Dr. Ying Xu, term faculty in the Department of English, for a talk on her research on Angel Island Poetry – a collection of Chinese verses carved into the walls of the U.S. Angel Island Immigration Station from 1910 to 1940. Dr. Xu will share the stories behind these poems, exploring them as “writings of incarceration” that resist erasure and reclaim identity. She argues that these verses challenge the racialized surveillance and exclusion that defined the Angel Island experience, transforming the “I” of the prison text into a layered, transnational “we.” Angel Island poetry breaks through the walls of injustice, calling for a remapping of justice and a re-location of the self beyond confinement.



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
