STEP 3: UNM & UNM CON Requirements

- 1. UNM Undergraduate Main Campus Application
 - If you are not a current UNM student, apply to <u>UNM Admissions</u>. You must apply to as an undergraduate degree-seeking student with an intended major of "Nursing", <u>not</u> "Online RN to BSN".
 - Official transcripts are required for all courses completed outside the UNM system. Mail transcripts to: UNM Admissions PO Box 4895 Albuquerque, New Mexico 87196-4895. Send electronic transcripts to apply@unm.edu.
- 2. In Progress Classes
 - If completing classes at an institution other than UNM, send official transcripts to UNM Admissions after final grades have been posted. You will not be allowed to register for Nursing courses until all required prerequisites are transferred to UNM.
- 3. <u>Books</u>
 - Information regarding Level I books is forthcoming. UNM CON will notify you via email with ordering details.
- 4. HSC Badge
 - Students will take the photo for their HSC badge during the required College of Nursing. orientation. Please bring your government issued ID during the HSC/UNM west orientation as requested.
- 5. Register for Level I Nursing Classes
 - UNM CON will email with Course Registration Numbers (CRN).
 - Registration for classes at UNM can only be completed once all holds are

resolved and all prerequisites are successfully completed and transferred to UNM. A registration tutorial can be found in LoboWeb >Student> Registration and Records> Registration (Add / Drop), Course Search, Check for Holds> then scroll down to just below the registration portal.

- 6. Order Scrubs
 - Your CON academic advising office contact will be in touch via email with information about how to order the UNM scrubs required for clinicals.
- 7. Clinical Documentation
 - Our CON specific office of Clinical Affairs will be in touch via email regarding the requirements for clinical and professional documentation. Professional documentation includes immunizations, certifications, drug screen, and trainings.

- 6. Mandatory Level I Orientation
 - The mandatory orientation will be held at the UNM College of Nursing. Details will be emailed.

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STEP 6: ATI TESTING, FOCUSED REVIEW, AND PULSE

Students will take ATI Practice and Proctored Assessments located under the ASSESEMENTS tab. These assessments will be enabled by your instructor. Practice tests help you prepare and master content prior to taking a proctored test. Once you complete a test, your performance profile report automatically generates, providing detailed information on your results. You can also locate results by clicking the **RESULTS** tab.

FOCUSED REVIEW

As you take your ATI Assessments you will be able to create a Focused Review under the ASSESSMENTS or RESULTS tab. Focused Review allows you to identify your gaps to prepare you for the proctored tests, and eventually NCLEX. You'll be provided materials based on your performance, so you know exactly what you need to study!



NGN ASSESSMENTS

Next Gen NCLEX questions are located under the ASSESSMENTS tab to help students understand new NEXT Gen NCLEX item types. These assessments will be enabled by yourinstructor.

ATI PULSE

This tool calculates your predicted probability of passing the NCLEX (PoP%), it displays whether you are on track, need improvement, or are at risk, and provides recommended strategies for remediation. The View Pulse button will display on the HOME page if a PoP% exists. Otherwise, Pulse can be located under the **RESULTS** tab.

SNA Memberships

Associate Membership:

- Pre-nursing students, including RN, enrolled in college/university programs designed as preparation for entrance intro a program to receive a degree/diploma in nursing.
- Available to any interested student at UNM.
- Associate members shall have all of the privileges of membership except the right to hold an office at any level including state and national.
- Not required to join NSNA, unless they wish to have one semester of prenursing count towards fulfillment of honor cords, or if they wish to attend an NSNA conference.

Active Membership:

- Students enrolled in a state approved program that leads to a licensure as a registered nurse.
- Registered nurses enrolled in programs leading to a baccalaureate degree with a major in nursing.
- Active members shall have all of the privileges of the membership.

SNA Honor Cord Requirements

Honor Cord Requirements:

1.SEMESTER REQUIREMENTS

a.Members must attend a minimum of 4 regularly scheduled UNMSNA meetings per semester. b.Members must attend 2 hours of a UNM SNA approved philanthropy opportunity per semester. c.Members must submit a membership application and pay the one-time fee of \$25.

d.Members must be current NSNA members.

e.Members must participate in the fundraising requirement (which can be fulfilled by purchasing items at the SNA store, donating to events or participating in fundraising activities.)

2. Honors cords will be provided free of charge to the UNM SNA members that meet the requirements.

- a. Active members who meet minimum requirements for three of five semesters get one honor cord.
- b. Members active five out of five semesters will receive two honor cords at the time of graduation.
- c. Active members that serve as a board member for two semesters will receive an additional honor cord.
- d. Active members who started as pre-nursing members, and paid NSNA dues as a pre-nursing member, must meet minimum requirements for one pre-nursing semester, and two out of four active nursing school semesters.
