#### 1. CALL TO ORDER AND CONFIRMATION OF QUORUM

Dean Finn called the meeting to order at 1:00 PM and confirmed a quorum.

### 2. ADOPTION OF THE AGENDA (action item)

## 4. FY26 LEGISLATIVE FUNDING REQUEST (RPSP) - (information item)

Chief Medical Investigator, Dr. Heather Jarrell, introduced the FY26 Legislative Funding Request (RPSP) agenda topic with a presentation slide. She explained that the Research and Public Service Projects (RPSP) program is the process through which the University of New Mexico (UNM) requests funding from the legislature. In this context, the Office of the Medical Investigator (OMI) is categorized under higher education. Dr. Jarrell noted that one requirement set by UNM Board of Regents is that RPSP requests must constitute at least 20% of the FY25 budget, which has been met.

The total FY26 RPSP funding request for OMI is approximately \$4,000,000.

#### **OMI Medical Examiner Salaries:**

The OMI Medical Examiners are housed within the Department of Pathology at UNM through the School of Medicine.

- Current OMI Medical Examiner salaries are at the 25<sup>th</sup> percentile for academic pathologists (based on Association of American Medical Colleges [AAMC])
- The OMI is the only statewide medical examiner's office housed within a university.
- Current medical examiner workforce shortage in US
  - o 800 medical examiners (estimated)
  - o Need a least 1,500 medical examiners in the US.
- Current competition for forensic pathologists:
  - o 41 Job postings as of 6/24/2024
  - o 37 US graduates from training in 2024
  - o Average salary offer is \$275,000
  - o Salary range: \$217,000 to \$400,000
  - o Median salary: \$280,500
- UNMH has listened and responded to our urgent need for recruitment, with salary increases above the average and median salary offer, as well as retention bonus eligibility at year 3, with a commitment to remain for 2 more years. Dr. Jarrell noted

that in her ten years at OMI, the office has been fully staffed for only about a year in total. Thanks to the support from UNMH and UNM Leadership, effective July 1, 2024, the salary increase offer for forensic pathologists will surpass the median and average salaries, enhancing OMI's competitiveness in the job market.

Dr. Jarrell highlighted that OMI currently has 6 forensic pathologists, including herself. Based on current caseloads, the office should have 11 pathologists. She shared promising news that two graduating residents have recently signed letters of offer. These residents will start their yearlong forensic pathology fellowship in July, which means that OMI will have increased number of pathologists within a year. There is optimism that with the competitive salary packages, the recruitment process will continue to be successful.

o Current cost with 6 medical examiners: \$356,952

o Total cost with 10 medical examiners: \$726,190

### **Bridge Funding for Locum Tenens Medical Examiners:**

Dr. Jarrell emphasized that offering competitive salary ranges for recruitment is more fiscally responsible strategy compared to the alternative of hiring locum tenens medical examiners. Locum tenens, who are essentially temporary medical examiners traveling across the country to work in various offices for short periods, are significantly expensive. The current cost of locum tenens while OMI is short-staffed is approximately \$100,000 per month. Dr. Jarrell presented a slide highlighting the projected cost for locum tenens for FY26, which amounts to \$1.2 million. She noted that the request for funding could be provided as non-recurring bridge funding to cover locum tenens costs until staffing levels are stabilized through competitive recruitment strategies.

Dr. Jarrell also noted that locum tenens do not handle criminally suspicious cases or homicides, leaving permanent staff to manage these more challenging cases. This has significantly increased the workload of existing pathologists, many of whom are handling caseloads as high as 400 autopsy equivalents per year, compared to the standard of 250 to avoid phase deficiencies. Exceeding certain thresholds can lead to phase one or phase two deficiencies, with the latter risking the loss of accreditation and contribute to the burnout of the six pathologist who are bearing these heavy caseloads.

- o Field Investigations Mid-Level Supervisor Positions
  - 1 person supervising 100 field investigators across the entire state.
  - 2024: 56 undocumented migrant deaths, 8 Field Deputy Medical Investigators in Dona Ana County (2023: 116 deaths)
- Other Supervisor Positions
- PA Support for caseloads: The OMI has 1.5 Pathologists' Assistants (PA). PA's help with our noncriminally suspicious cases.

# 5. **BUDGET - (information item)**

Dr. Jarrell presented an overview of the OMI FY24 income statement projections for the period from July 1, 2023 - June 30,2024. Dr. Jarrell highlighted that we are projected to have a positive margin of approximately \$700,000 this year, attributed to the following factors:

- Faculty savings resulting from the vacancy of needed forensic pathologists' positions
- O Delays in onboarding locum tenens.

Dr. Jarrell observed that our current state appropriations amount is \$10.6 million, compared to \$5.3 million in 2021.
