AKT-MP Study Progress

To date, 368 patients have agreed to participate in our study, and 315 participants have completed their first interview. Of the participants who completed their first interview, 78 participants also completed their second interview. We aim to recruit and interview 195 more patients to become participants in our study in the coming months.

We are happy to announce that we received new state funding to study transplant recipients' experience after they receive a transplant! Therefore, we will be conducting a third interview with participants who received a transplant, about one year after their surgery.

Every year, people from across the United States are evaluated for kidney transplantation at UNMH. Your participation in this study will help us learn more about patients being evaluated for kidney transplant so we can help improve the process for future patients.

What were your motivators for completing kidney transplant evaluation?

"I grew up with a disease that has run in my family for many years. I got diagnosed in my early 20's with the understanding that someday I would need a transplant and/or go on dialysis. Having seen the change in lifestyle that dialysis put my family through I was motivated to do everything I could to get a kidney transplant...I have a human angel in my life who donated her kidney to me. **She saved my life**. She is doing great and living a very fulfilling life as well. I thank her every day for the special gift that has allowed me to live life to the fullest!!!" -Helen

What was the biggest change in your life after getting a kidney transplant?

"The most profound change in my life following my kidney transplant has been the **remarkable sense of liberation** and the return to a more normal and enjoyable existence. <u>National News:</u> In August, *Time* magazine published an article about kidney disease in outdoor laborers. This form of kidney disease, called Chronic Kidney Disease of nontraditional origin (CKDnt), is thought to be caused by several factors that compound onto one another. These factors include climate change, particularly heat, humidity, and hard labor. People are thought to develop CKDnt by working laborious outdoor jobs that offer little protection from increasing temperatures caused by climate change. To address this issue, the Occupational Safety and Health Administration is working to establish heat safety standards to protect outdoor workers.

Remember to follow the dietary advice of your kidney care team.




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


Book Recommendation

I had my kidney transplant in 2016. I was on peritoneal dialysis (PD) for 3 years prior to undergoing transplant. In 1982, I found out I was born with one kidney. I worked the entire time during PD and my transplant. It was and still is a challenge to keep up with all the meds, labs and appointments, but I feel so much better since my transplant. I know how scary kidney disease can be. My experiences allow me to help others fear kidney disease just a bit less, making me a perfect Peer Navigator.

What were your motivators for completing kidney transplant evaluation? "As for the motivation for completing the transplant, I did not want to continue to be sick so I decided a transplant was my only option."

What was the biggest change in your life after getting a kidney transplant? "I didn't realize how sick I really was because I feel so much better since my transplant. There are so many more changes in my life I don't think I can list them all but a few that are the most important that come to mind immediately are; I am no longer on dialysis, I can travel easier, eat a more varied diet, have more energy, started walking daily. Lastly I really do watch my fluid intake and drink a lot more water and eat healthier."
